



The Rural Pact Coordination Group



- Established by the European Commission (2022) as a special group to further develop the Rural Pact and steer its process
- Members: European non-governmental organisations (inc. the Smart Village Network Services), civil society organisations, business organisations and public authority organisations, representatives of academia and research, ERP (ELARD, ERCA, PREPARE), European Parliament/ MEPs, CoR, EESC, Trio of EU presidencies
- Request by the Commission to develop a Declaration in response to the 9 questions of the LTVRA Report

Strong participatory process to develop the Declaration within the **RPCG**

- Starting in the Summer of 2024.
- Developing draft Declaration based on members' inputs (Oct 2024) - survey on questions in the LTVRA
- Discussing draft declaration with members: two rounds of discussions & refinements (Nov 2024) 76% of members participated in the consultation (either in person or writing)
- Adoption of the Declaration: 12 Dec 2024

Structure of the Declaration





Preamble

- 1. The future of rural areas is a concern of our whole society
- 2. Rural challenges need urgent responses
- 3. The future rural development policy must take the needs of rural areas more seriously
- 4. Turning the long-term rural vision into a concrete strategy and realising the Rural Pact model
- Building local capacity and creating local ownership
- 6. Improving monitoring of EU spending on rural areas

The current situation

- Rural areas are not just places of challenges but also places of opportunities.
- The future of rural areas is not just the concern of rural people but our whole society.
- Rural areas and communities face capacity constraints and lack of access to funds.
- CLLD approaches are underfunded and not used to their full potential.
- Future rural development policy must take the needs of rural areas seriously.

Smart Villages within CLLD

- CLLD within the CAP now includes both LEADER (micro-regional level) and Smart Villages (local community level)
- Innovation is place-based (RP Webinar on Rural Innovation)
- · Local communities need to take the lead
- "Smart Villages aim to strengthen the resilience of rural communities by fostering technological and social innovation at the local rural community level, following the CLLD principles." (RPCG Declaration)

Implications for future policy

- Reinforce multi-policy and multi-funding support, including rural proofing
- Interest-representation of rural communities need to be strengthened ("We don't have tractors.")
- Mandate MSs to allocate a compulsory minimum share of funds to rural development of all funds -30%
- Reinforce LEADER/CLLD and Smart Villages make a higher minimum allocation (at least 10% of funds)
- (Alternatively) consider a dedicated rural development programme & fund (European Rural
 Development Fund – ERUDF).
- Flexibility for Member States on design/ priorities.



- Rural Development Strategies at all levels
- The Rural Pact implementation model (RPSO: 'Making the Rural Pact Happen'): coordination, designated government members on RP, compulsory inter-ministerial coordination groups for rural proofing as conditions for accessing RD funds
- Capacity building for MAs in rural development and rural proofing

Build capacity at the local level



- Allow flexibility in the application processes for local beneficiaries (SCOs, etc.)
- Provide seed funding for the preparation and idea development
- Support in innovation & international exchange

Improve monitoring


- Monitor spending according to sectors and types of territory
- Better understanding on how far money goes to rural areas is the basis of further improvements



✓ 11 Do you think that Declarations – like that of the RPCG – can be useful in influencing policy?

20 out of 24 people answered this question



How far it's already been used?



Have you or your organisation already used the RPCG Declaration to influence future rural development actions or policies?

19 out of 24 people answered this question

No, we have not used the Declaration 9 resp. 47.4%

No, we have not used the Declaration but carried out other 'advocacy' actions to promote similar policy changes


6 resp. 31.6%

What's next?

- Common goal: To improve post-2027 EU financial framework and policies
- Promoting these ideas at all levels (RPCG members and beyond): regional, national and EU
- RPCG Chair and Vice-Chair: trying to arrange a series of discussions at the EU level (DGs, EP, etc.)
- How to jointly amplify rural voices if "we don't have the tractors"? Interest representation of rural areas is weak compared to other interests
- Speaking with 'one voice': too many declarations/ petitions, etc. might divide our efforts?
